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

Understandably Oliver's latest album, the brilliant Mothers Ruin, dominated the set starting with the title track, Walk Away and then, for me the highlight of an outstanding set, the moving and beautiful If You're Leaving (I liked it so much I had to buy the album). We were also treated to the new one Busy Going Nowhere (which Oliver had finished arranging at about half three on the day). A blinding set and the large audience who were there quite early were very appreciative. Can't wait for Oliver and full band to return.

Next up were Anemo, a band making their CRS debut and fronted by the brilliant vocals of Hazelle Woodhurst and aided and abetted by sister Erika. They

opened with just keyboard player Kingsley Sage and guitarist Matt Palmer on stage. The superb Filthy Figure Skater was one of the highlights. When the full band hit the stage, with Mike Kelly being one of the most laid back and innovative drummers I have ever seen, Anemo proceeded to blow the hell out of the audience, playing a set made up mostly of material from their stunning album Slowburn. Hazelle and Erika's vocals weaved in and out of the bands amazing musical dexterity and made an instant impression and have so many strengths, whether it's the



vocals, Kingsley's keyboards, Matt's guitars or the lyrics on tracks like Johnny 5 and Kursk. This is a band that's going somewhere, and one that will return to the CRS next year. If these aren't best newcomers of the year at December's BOTY's then I'll eat my words and they've got to be in with a shot for best
